Good morning Forest Update Subscribers,

I love hearing stories about how people have come to own their woodlands. I've learned from chatting with landowners that many of us who have purchased our land have similar stories about finding our particular, justperfect piece. Here's ours:

We had been searching for a livable house on 20-50 acres somewhere within driving distance of Virginia Tech. We looked at a 50-acre parcel in Shawsville with a 360 view from the top. Unfortunately, the property was riddled with ATV trails. We visited a 20-acre parcel near Floyd with planted white pine, a spectacular view, and a half-built, mostly rotting house that needed to be demolished. Another property in Floyd, also with magnificent views, had a half-mile steeply-sloped driveway that would be impossible to drive up in ice or snow. We found a 15-acre parcel in Giles County bordering the National Forest – with a repossessed home that had been stripped of anything and everything valuable. Some properties would have been ok with me; others were ok with my husband. But after 2 years, we had found none that were perfect and we gave up actively looking.

About a year later, my husband was celebrating his  $20^{th}$  anniversary working at VT and was sitting next to a colleague who was celebrating her  $25^{th}$ . He just happened to mention that we wanted to own some land. And she said something along the lines of: We own a farm with two houses that that we've been renting out for years now. We may be interested in selling to the right buyers.

So, we went and looked. It was the first place we pulled up to and both instantly knew - this was it. Good location, fully-functional houses, manageable driveway, great views, and an unexpected and truly wonderful bonus – river access. And fortunately, she considered us to be the *right buyers*! We put off the purchase for a year. And then we

### **Online Woodland Options for Landowners**

This 12-week self-paced on-line course teaches the fundamentals of forest management. Topics include: Setting management goals and objectives; Forest history; Stewardship and sustainability; Marking your boundary lines, and locating, reading, and understanding your deed; Using maps and photos, Google Earth, and soil surveys; Forest ecology and management; Sources of assistance and planning options.

Upon completion of the program, you can have a draft forest management plan. Natural resource professionals serve as mentors and the class winds up with an optional end-of-the-semester hands-on field trip.
