Good morning Forest Update Subscribers,

Happiest of new years to all of you! I hope everyone had a restful and happy break.

Last fall a friend hunted deer on our land. In preparation, he set out several game cameras. He shared the best photos and videos they caught and I so very much enjoyed watching them. I was amazed at how much activity goes on outdoors most days. In addition to a few very large bucks and approximately 10,000 does, we have not 1, but 2, black bears, turkey, raccoons, the best back-scratching tree in the universe, and of course, squirrels. I'll share some of the best photos and videos on the <u>VFLEP Facebook</u> <u>page</u> this morning.

We've done some wildlife habitat improvements, including planting fruit trees and pine (for thermal cover), and maintaining a pond. But many of the natural features of our property already lend themselves to wildlife habitat, such as river frontage, an abundance of black cherry and walnut trees, many miles of edge habitat, and the surrounding wooded landscape.

But having quality wildlife habitat is not always enough. Some wildlife species are facing serious health problems. You can learn about two of these problems, chronic wasting disease (CWD, a video), and rabbit hemorrhagic virus disease, in the <u>Winter 2022 edition of the Virginia</u> <u>Forest Landowner Update newsletter</u>. forested tracts in one of these counties: Albemarle, Amherst, Augusta, Botetourt, Greene, Madison, Nelson, Rockbridge, or Rockingham, to participate in a study on the effects of different timber harvest types on forest regeneration. Tracts should be 10 acres or larger and have been partially harvested 10-15 years ago. I would identify tree species and measure stem diameters, tree heights, and sun exposure throughout each tract. There would be no destructive sampling of trees.

• 2022 the Year of the Hardwood By: Michelle Stoll, Virginia Department of Forestry

A common concern among Virginians is that all the hardwood forests are being harvested and replaced with planted pine. And while there is indeed plenty of planted pine in the commonwealth, there are actually more acres in hardwoods today than there were in the 1940s. In fact, total standing volume of hardwoods (what is growing in the woods) has increased from 10 billion cubic feet in 1940 to over 25 billion cubic feet in 2019. And the acreage of hardwoods across Virginia has remained stable in every region from 2001 to 2019. This is good news, because Virginia's hardwood forests provide high ecological, societal, and economic values. <u>Read</u> <u>more...</u>

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of me along the road). You may not be as familiar with other rabbits that may be found or have historically occurred in restricted areas of Virginia, such as the Appalachian cottontail (*Sylvilagus obscurus*), marsh rabbit (*Sylvilagus palustris*), Mearn's eastern cottontail (*Sylvilagus floridanus mearnsii*), Smith's Island cottontail (*Sylvilagus floridanus hitchensi*) or the nonnative black-tailed jackrabbit (*Lepus californicus*), which is actually a hare. In addition to being charming additions to the landscape (when they aren't eating our garden vegetables), rabbits are important indicators of healthy ecosystems. <u>Read more...</u>

Online Woodland Options for Landowners

This 12-week self-paced on-line course teaches the fundamentals of forest management. Topics include: Setting management goals and objectives; Forest history; Stewardship and sustainability; Marking your boundary lines, and locating, reading, and understanding your deed; Using maps and photos, Google Earth, and soil surveys; Forest ecology and management; Sources of assistance and planning options.
