Good Morning Forest Update Subscribers,

On my drive home from work the day after Halloween, I noticed brightly lit Christmas trees in the windows of several homes. While I too enjoy the festive glow, November 1<sup>st</sup> is a bit early for me. But if two months of holiday splendor gives you joy, I say go for it!

If you are like me and celebrate Christmas, but have not yet set up your tree, I encourage you to support [Virginia's Christmas Tree Growers](#). On their website, you can find a Christmas tree farm near you. By purchasing a Virginia grown tree, you are supporting local businesses and landowners, and helping our economy. Live Christmas tree sales contribute over \$11 million a year to Virginia's economy. Our growers produce more than 4.3 million trees that are grown on over 10,000 acres. This makes the commonwealth 7<sup>th</sup> in the nation in total number of trees grown and 6<sup>th</sup> in total acreage in Christmas tree production.

In addition to economic benefits, live trees also provide numerous environmental benefits. First, during the 5-10 years it takes for a Christmas tree to become merchantable, they take up and store carbon, keep soil in place, and improve water quality. Second, since they are evergreen, they provide important winter shelter to wildlife. Third, real trees are 100% recyclable, renewable, and biodegradable. And, finally, you don't have to make room in your attic/creepy basement to store them 11 months of the year.
