

Introduction

As a private woodland owner, you are a vital link in the sustainability of Virginia's forest resources. Your land provides many benefits to all Virginians, including wood products, wildlife habitat, clean air and water, and recreational opportunities. Because woodland owners like you own and manage two-thirds of the state's forestland, the decisions you make regarding your woods today will impact the quality of Virginia's forests for many years. The purpose of this publication is to provide you with a set of suggestions for starting or continuing to actively manage your land. In addition, this guide will help you

understand the importance of timber harvest planning and how to work with professional foresters and natural resource management agencies.

The information contained in this publication regarding taxation and environmental regulations is accurate but should not be construed as official government interpretation. Regulations and laws are constantly evolving, so you are encouraged to obtain professional forestry assistance before making your final management decisions. What Is Sustainable Forestry?

Virginia's forests make a vital contribution to our state and beyond by providing economic, consumer,




environmental, recreational and aesthetic benefits essential to our quality of life. While sustainability is a dynamic concept, some basic principles are clear: sustainable forestry consists of those management practices that meet present needs without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs. Specifically, sustainable forestry integrates reforestation, and the managing, growing, nurturing and harvesting of trees for useful products and ecosystem benefits such as conserving soil, air and water quality, sequestering carbon, perpetuating biological diversity, conserving wildlife and aquatic habitats,

improving recreational opportunities and protecting

Examples of sustainable forestry practices include:

- Regenerating forests as soon as possible following a timber barrent
- Minimizing the impact of forest management activities on water quality
- Maintaining important habitat elements for wildlife and plant species
- Managing for populations of imperiled and critically imperiled species
- Protecting forests with exceptional conservation value.
- · Managing biological diversity
- Limiting the spread of exotic (non-native) plant species and pests





Management Plan Addendum

Introduction

The American Tree Farm System has developed this management plan addendum for Tree Farmers whose management plans already meet the current requirements and are looking to undate their plans to be in conformance with the newly released 2010 - 2015 American Forest Foundation Standards of Sustainability. All lands certified by the American Tree Farm System must meet the requirements of the 2010 AFF Standards by December 31, 2010.

The Management Plan Addendum covers only the new items required in the 2010 Standards that were not previously addressed under the 2004 Standards (which you would have been certified under if you were certified before 2010).

Instructions

Management plans for properties certified by the American Tree Farm System are required to be active, adaptive, embody the landowner's current objectives, remain appropriate for the land certified and reflect the current state of knowledge about forestry and natural resource management. An active management plan is updated on a frequent basis with handwritten notes, plan revisions and informal plan amend ments such as this document. Please consider contacting a professional forester (consulting forester, landowner assistance forester, state agency forester) to assist you with your addendum or if your plans needs a more complete update.

- 1) Read through your current management plan. If you see any items that you would like to update, please consider including handwritten notes. Please consider reviewing your management plan annually and update informally with any pertinent information
- 2) Please review each new required plan element (new under the 2010 Standards) and evaluate whether or not your current management plan meets the new requirements. If your current plan meets these new requirements, please make note of where in your plan this information can be
- 3) Where there are updates needed, please follow the guidance under each required resource elements. a. For any check box sections, please add comments if appropriate
- 4) Once you have completed the addendum, please attach to your current management plan. Please be sure to initial and date the addendum.

American Tree Farm System

- Plantations are an accepted silvicultural practice
- Not a required practice
- Not directly addressed within the Standard

Forest Stewardship Council

- Not a required practice
- A planted forest does not automatically qualify as a plantation
- If it does qualify as a plantation, subject to additional criteria

Individual

- Applies to individual forest properties and management practices
- Property owners hold the certification certificate
- Owners are audited annually, and must pay the cost of audits

• Group

- Certifies a group of properties under one certification certificate
- Certificate is held by a group manager
- The group shares the expense of the audit
- Only a sample of properties in the group pare audited each year

 - Less than 2,500 acres OR
 - Low-intensity management OR
 - Managed exclusively for non-timber forest products

- Group Certification
 - SLIMF Groups
 - Columbia Forest Products
 - Center for Forest & Wood

Certification

- Non-permanent
 - Can be terminated at any time
 - If land is sold, no longer certified
- Concerned with management
- Property rights are maintained
 - May need to decertify all or part of land

Conservation Easement

- Permanent stays with the land
- Concerned with keeping land open
- Landowner gives up property rights
 - Limits on development
 - Limits on subdivisions
