From I-81:

- Take I-77 south to exit 14(Galax/Hillsville)
- Merge onto US 58 West towards Galax for approximately 12 miles.
- After passing all the way through the City of Galax, you will come to a blinking yellow caution light.
- Matthews State Forest Office is the 2nd Right after the caution light. (about 1/2 mile after the "Welcome to Grayson County" sign) Large wooden building and cabin on hill.

If you pass the intersection with Rt 94, you have gone too far.
