Now that it's summer and everything is leafed out, you may be noticing some exotic invasives on your property. The USDA Forest Service/University of Georgia's Center for Invasive Species and Ecosystem Health site (www.bugwood.org) is a great resource to help you identify these plants. In a week or so, I'll be conducting some manual control of wine raspberry on my neighbor's property. Basically this entails picking the ripe fruit to prevent the seed from spreading. I don't know how effective this method is, but it is definitely delicious!

And speaking of invasive species, in this summer's **You Ain't From around Here!** article, you will learn about a new effort in Virginia to control invasive species, called Cooperative Weed Management Areas (CWMAs). **One already exists in Highland County**, and the potential is there for more to be formed.

In this edition of the Forest Landowner Update:

- Forestry Operations and Water Quality in Virginia. The Federal Clean
 Water Act (CWA) and Amendments generally consider water quality
 pollutants (e.g., sediment, temperature, chemicals) from normal forestry
 and agricultural operations as non-point source pollutants (NPSP) under
 Section 319. This means that agricultural and forestry operations are not
 easy to define, locate, and evaluate, unlike many industrial operations.

the Virginia Department of Game & Inland Fisheries (VDGIF) plan to reintroduce elk to Buchanan, Dickenson and Wise counties in SW Virginia. Beginning in 2012, elk were returned to the area over three years, with the final 45 animals being released this April. Read more...

- You Ain't From Around Here! A Better Approach to Invasives? Landowners, both large and small, are combating invasives of various kinds all across the US and, indeed, across the world. Most of us take small steps to deal with those that most directly impact us weeds in the garden, stink bugs in the house, garlic mustard around the lawn. Other forest owners deal with various invasives on a larger scale, including trees like Ailanthus, vines like kudzu and bittersweet, stilt grass, and dozens more. Read more...
