- **Generation NEXT.** The team met last month to plan the 2018 offerings of Generation NEXT workshops. In these workshops, CPAs, estate planning attorneys, and conservation professionals will provide you and your family with the tools you need to pass your land and your woodland legacy to the next generation – while keeping it Intact, In Forest, and In Family. We have 4 mini and 2 full workshops scheduled (see sidebar). The application process will open later this month.
- **Spotted lanternfly**. As you may recall, the exotic invasive spotted lanternfly was found in Frederick County, VA earlier this year. While they do feed on tree-of-heaven, they also feed on grapes and fruit trees. They lay their egg masses on any vertical smooth surfaces, natural or man-made, from October to early spring. This poses the possibility of human-movement of egg masses on vehicles or outdoor furniture. Learn what to look for and how to report a potential sighting here:
