Good morning Forest Landowner e-Update Subscribers,

September is here. The gardens are winding down. Fall yard cleanups are underway. And while you may be tempted to clean out those pollinator gardens that are starting to look a little ragged, I urge you to wait until late March to do so. They may look rough to us, but they look like dinner to many species of seed-eating insects and birds. They also look like a fine place for certain pollinators to lay eggs and for others to take cover during harsh winter weather. Waiting until late March ensures that new food sources are coming on-line and that eggs have hatched. And the late-blooming goldenrod provides a wonderful source of much-needed food this time of year. When March comes around, cleanup of dead materials is fairly quick and easy. And it is oh-so satisfying when the first blooms of the year begin. My pollinator gardens are far and away my favorite (and easiest) additions to the yard.
