Good morning Forest Update Subscribers,

Last weekend as I was cleaning the house, I realized that 25% of my time was spent vacuuming up <u>Asian lady</u> <u>beetles</u> and <u>stink bugs</u>. Which got me to thinking, above and beyond the cost of damaged/lost crops, the expense of herbicides and pesticides, reductions in forest productivity, decreases in biodiversity, and displacement of native species, invasive species come with a personal cost as well. I value my time at about \$1 million an hour. It takes me 4 hours to clean the house, so that's a cool million (per week) they owe me. In addition, my husband is obsessed with catching stinkbugs (<u>see this article</u> for details on his descent into stinkbug-fueled madness). And check out a <u>new publication on exotic species</u>. As always, early identification and control is the best strategy for minimizing invasives and reducing your personal costs. Some great resources include:

- Plant Invaders of MidAtlantic Natural Areas A good field guide for invasive plants. This book is currently being updated by the author. I have an order in for reprints and will let you know when they are available.
- <u>Invasive.org</u>, from our friends at UGA and their partners, is a helpful website for identification.
- MAEDN is a free App that helps with identification and allows you to report new infestations.

I do have some wonderful news to share with you. At long last, our book, *Legacy Planning: A Guide for Virginia Landowners*, has been published. This book has been (too) many years in the making. Thanks to all the woodland owners who shared their photos and stories and to our talented graphic designer, Lesha Berkel, for making it look great. You
