Good morning Forest Update Subscribers,

As I began work on this newsletter on Earth Day last week, I took a short break to bring a wheelbarrow full of firewood up to the house. Because we had the woodstove going. At the end of April. Not unheard of, of course. I'm sure we all recall the two hard freezes we had in May last year. Hopefully we can avoid that this year!

This got me to thinking about how fortunate we are to be able to heat with wood. For many of us who own land, firewood is an inexpensive and plentiful resource. We always have wood from fallen trees, dead trees, trees removed during timber stand improvement cuts, invasive species removal, and friends have even dropped wood off at the house. But how does cutting/using firewood benefit the earth?

Most often, firewood is obtained by cutting dead, unhealthy, undesirable, and nonnative invasive species. This improves the overall health of the woods, a common management goal for woodland owners.

Additionally, wood is a renewable source of energy. And while carbon dioxide is released when the wood is burned, is taken back up by trees that are still growing and converted back into wood.

Also, wood is local – at least it should be! Firewood should not be moved across great distances to help prevent the transport of diseases and insects. A good rule of thumb is to avoid moving firewood more than ten miles from where it was cut or collected. This can help prevent the human-aided spread of tree-killing diseases and insects, such as the emerald ash borer.

And for those who don't own land, you may gather down and dead wood from the National Forest – with a <u>Fuel Wood</u> <u>Permit</u>. Keep in mind, this wood is for personal use only and cannot be resold.

Summer Online Woodland Options for Landowners

This 12-week, self-paced course will allow you to gain an introductory level understanding of basic forest management principles and techniques and to use this understanding to become better land stewards. It is intended for private forest landowners of any acreage; this course is not intended for forest landowners who have substantial experience working alone or with natural resource professionals in the management of their forests. Teachers, local leaders, and interested citizens are also welcome to join.

Topics Covered Include:

- Setting management goals and objectives
- Writing a management plan
- Using aerial photos, topographic maps & soil surveys
- Determining boundary lines
- Forest ecology and management
- Working with natural resource professionals

Students completing all the advanced activities will finish the class with a draft forest management plan. Additionally, a group of mentors, consisting of natural resource professionals and experienced landowners, will interact with students weekly via discussion boards.

An optional end-of-semester field trip will allow students to hone their new skills and interact with one another and natural resource professionals. The 2021 field trip will be held at the Holiday Lake 4-H Educational Center in Appomattox when COVID regulations permit.
