Gather to Grow: A Conference to Honor the Past and Shape the Future of Forest Farming

Good Morning Forest Update Subscribers,

Along with the arrival of cooler temperatures in the fall is the arrival of the hunting season for white-tailed deer. With [chronic wasting disease](#) detected in Montgomery County, [this year's deer hunting season](#) arrived very early - September 2 to be exact. We have several friends who are allowed to hunt on our land. And for that, I am grateful. But that has not always been the case.

When I was about 7, our neighbor harvested a deer and hung it in his yard. That was the single most traumatic experience of my young life. I was horrified and refused to make eye contact with the neighbor for years. The appeal of killing for sport alluded me; the thought of eating venison tuned my stomach. You see, I was a child of the 1970's and the animated Disney classic Bambi had a major impact on my psyche. In fact, to this day, just reading the synopsis of the movie on the Wikipedia page brings tears to my eyes.

It wasn't until I started taking forestry classes that I began to understand the benefits of hunting for herd and forest health. Too many deer in an area can lead to disease and hunger and takes a toll on native vegetation. Deer browse our gardens, orchards, and hardwood regeneration in the forest. They preferentially browse on native plants (species they evolved with), creating more space for nonnative invasives to grow.

As a landowner, I've witnessed first-hand the problems our increasing deer infestation causes. Deer in the garden, deer in the orchard, deer in the road, deer looking in our dining room window (I'm ok with this one; the dogs, not so much). While I

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don't want them all gone nor do I think I'll ever be able to shoot one myself, I do applaud each deer our friends remove from our herd. And I now happily dine on local, high-protein, lean, organic, inexpensive, free-range venison.
