Good morning Forest Update Subscribers,

Thankfully most, if not all of us, have gotten some (or more than some) rain. This has helped a bit with allergies. In addition, the rain has resulted in mushrooms popping up everywhere on our farm.

There is an old oak stump along the road I use to walk the dogs to the river. Last year I was thrilled to find my favorite mushroom, a large chicken of the woods, growing on it. This year, I was even more thrilled to find 3 growing on it.

Now, I am overly cautious when it comes to foraging for wild mushrooms. But I feel comfortable eating chicken of the woods because they are quite distinctive and don't have any close look-alikes.

There are seven different species of chicken of the woods (*Laetiporus* spp.) in North America. Four are found east of the Rockies. They all have shelf-like growth and all but one are bright orange. These mushrooms are both saprobic (living on dead wood), and parasitic (attacking live hosts).

Chicken of the woods has a texture and flavor similar to chicken and can be used as a meat substitute. Like tofu, it absorbs flavors wonderfully. My husband sautés it with an obscene amount of butter. And, as you might expect, it tastes delicious. I just tell myself that the benefits (antioxidants among others) outweigh the butter.

If you haven't eaten a chicken of the woods, I highly recommend it. But of course, be sure you have a correct identification before you toss a wild mushroom in your stir fry!
